# X-ALD Newborn Screening in Missouri Goes Live

## Dear Practitioner, Laboratory Manager, or Newborn Nursery Manager:

The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services' Newborn Screening Program launched a full population pilot in December 2021 to screen all Missouri newborns for X-linked Adrenoleukodystrophy (X-ALD). While screening results for X-ALD have not appeared on the routine NBS laboratory reports during this pilot/implementation period, all newborns were tested for this disorder, and any displaying high risk abnormal results were referred for further confirmatory testing.

Effective December 1, 2022, the Missouri State Public Health Laboratory (MSPHL) will be going live with the routine reporting of X-ALD on the standard NBS laboratory reports. All infants with high-risk abnormal results for X-ALD will be phoned and faxed to the health care provider of record and to our contracted genetic referral centers who will coordinate confirmatory testing and next steps.

Adrenoleukodystrophy is an X-linked genetic disease that affects males most severely. ALD primarily affects the nervous system and the adrenal glands. ALD may cause progressive loss of the myelin sheath, which acts as an insulator for the nerves in the brain and spinal cord. This can result in a variety of neurological problems including cognitive, mobility, and sensory issues. ALD may also cause a deficiency of certain hormones due to damage to the adrenal glands. Adrenal insufficiency may cause weakness, weight loss, skin changes, vomiting, and coma. If left untreated, the severe form of ALD can lead to critical and irreversible disabilities that can ultimately lead to death. Early diagnosis through newborn screening allows for proactive care, consistent monitoring, and lifesaving treatment.

As the MSPHL continues screening, there is an increased likelihood for providers to have newborns in their care with high-risk newborn screening results for ALD.
